

TOPS NEEDED!

Looking ahead to the 2023 NYS Fair, each year the club sells tops to the attendees as a fundraiser for a couple local charities. We sell enough that we need a stockpile of **500-600 tops!**

Tops can be turned, scrolled, or even made on a laser/cnc!

Don't know how to make a top? Come to a turning workshop to learn! Charlie and others will be happy to show you! Here are three YouTube videos to check out: Making a Top

Wood Magazine Jason Geiser Gwinnett Woodturners

Mike Vecellio provides some great instructions for making tops in two of his past columns — <u>August 2020 & March 2023</u>. Check those out!

Yes, tops can be scrolled also. There are two methods. The first is to create a compound cut spinner using a pattern from Al Baggetta that can be found here. The pattern is a distance down the page. He has a video of the process on YouTube here. The second method is to create a round disc and put a dowel with a point through the center. Any round disc can be made that is about 2-3" in diameter. A sample set of discs are in a pattern on dmidea.eu in the toys category here. Print the discs at about 80%. Steve Good also has one on his website here; search for toy top. As stated, any round disc can be used to create a top. No special designs need to be added. Be creative!

Finishing? The buyers love it when you add color to plain tops. Magic markers work fine! Please no glitter!

What Do I Do With Them? Bring to any meeting or event. If you can't make one, you can always drop them off at Eight Acres, just let us know you are stopping by!

haven't done very much new this month as I am also spending time enjoying my grandchild.

However, I finished my goal of 200 tops for the State Fair. See Figure 1 for the box with the last 100 tops. I hope we get many more from the club as we could use a lot more. 
Some of you know that I like to make bowls from a board so I glued up 2 strips each of maple and cherry 2 inches wide. Figure 2 shows that glue-up.



When that was dry, I cross cut the result, flipped every other board

and re-glued it back together.

A little
hint when
doing this:
cut an
extra slat
to use as a
spacer for
the cross
cut. Figure
3 shows the



result of that step.

I, and others, have written on how to complete the bowl from this point. The only thing I will mention again is that I like to cut the rings on the lathe. That makes it much easier to assemble the rings for the bowl. I have shown the photo of the jig I use in a past article. Figure 4 shows the completed 8 inch bowl.



Today I cut 3 each of maple and cherry 1 ¾ inch wide. That will make a 10 inch bowl.

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Make a Box & Bring to ANY SIG Meeting or Event

Turned, Scrolled, Traditional Box, Whatever!!

The folks at the Joslyn Center are desperate for boxes. Please step up and make one or two (or more!).

BEADS OF COURAGE BOXES

Beads of Courage is a non-profit organization that is dedicated to improving the quality of life for children and teens coping with serious illness, their families, and the clinicians who care for them. Children being treated for life-threatening illnesses are given beads as they undergo a variety of treatments. Boxes are one of the vessels in which they keep their beads.

The Syracuse Joslin Diabetes Center contacted the club requesting that our members make boxes for distribution to kids undergoing treatment for diabetes at the Center. They are looking for boxes of any type whether turned, scrolled, carved, or assembled using traditional woodworking. Members are encouraged to build and donate one or more boxes to fill the Center's urgent needs. Doug North, our president is managing our involvement in the program. Bring the completed boxes to meetings/other events or arrange for their receipt by Doug (dnorth@twcny.rr.com or 315-753-1121). We want to track and photograph each donated box.

There are some guidelines for size, finish, etc. We recently clarified the sizes so these are revised guidelines.

Wood Thickness & Weight:

• The boxes should not be heavy or bulky. Wall thicknesses should be ¼" to not more than ½". Please, not super thin and delicate.

Dimensions:

- ◆ Turned Boxes: Around 6x6" and not larger than 8x8"
 - Flatwork Boxes: Not smaller than 6x6x3" and not larger than 8x8x3"

Base & Lids:

- Box bases should be wide enough so the box is stable & does not tip over easily
- Lids should be easy for small or ill children to remove or lift.
- Any finials should be easy for a small child to grasp and not too elaborate so they don't break

Design Consideration:

- The boxes should be able to <u>transition with the child into</u> <u>adulthood</u> and be a keepsake for many years as the patients life with the diagnosis for a lifetime.
- Avoid excessively elaborate designs that may easily break or be damaged.
- If possible, incorporate one of the *Beads of Courage* beads into the box. See Barbara at any meeting to obtain one. The club purchased the beads

Finishes:

- Please use a safe, non-toxic finish.
- Do not use finishes like linseed oil that take a long time to outgas.
- Refrain from painting the boxes. Instead, highlight the beauty of the wood with clear varnish, a stain, and/or wood burning.

WOOD EDUCATION - KENTUCKY COFFEETREE

entucky coffeetree (Gymnocladus dioicus) is a unique tree with large, woody pods and very large leaves made up of smaller leaflets. With its bold form, contorted branching, unique bark and decorative clusters of large pods rattling in the wind, Kentucky coffeetree is an exceptional winter ornamental. Leaves emerge in late spring a striking pinkbronze color. As the beautiful, large airy leaves mature they become dark bluishgreen above. The light, airy shade (semishade) of this tree makes gardening under it possible. This tree's yellow fall color contrasts nicely with the clusters of dark, maturing pods.

The tree varies from 60-70 feet high with a spread of 40-50 feet and a trunk up to 3 feet in diameter. Branches are stout, pithy, and blunt; roots are fibrous. The Kentucky coffeetree is a moderately fastgrowing tree, and male trees are often grown in parks and along city streets for ornamental purposes. The tree is typically fairly short-lived, healthy trees living from 100 to 150 years. The Kentucky coffeetree sheds its leaves early during the fall and appears bare for up to 6 months.


Kentucky coffeetree has a Janka hardness rating of 1,390, just a bit tougher than white oak. It is a special type of ringporous wood where the pores congregate in the latewood in small groups called pore clusters—a feature unique to Kentucky Coffeetree. Its heartwood is an orange to reddish brown. Yellowish white sapwood is very narrow and well defined against heartwood. The color of the heartwood as well as its surface texture is like that of red oak, though other

people think the grain pattern is similar to ash. There's very little of the yellowish-white sapwood, and it has a sharp boundary. If you have any difficulty distinguishing the wood, shine a UV lamp on it to remove your doubts. The wood has a fairly strong reputation for insect resistance and reportedly withstands ground contact as a fencepost.

Fun Facts:

- ♦ Its common name refers to the use of the pods by early settlers as a coffee substitute.
- ◆ From 1976 to 1994, Kentucky coffeetree was the state tree of Kentucky, after which the tulip poplar was returned to that designation.
- ◆ The naked appearance of the tree is reflected through the Kentucky coffeetree's Greek genus name, which means *naked* branch.
- ♦ There are only a handful of trees of the Gymnocladus genus worldwide, with all but one in Asia. Kentucky Coffeetree is the only native North American in the group.
- ♦ The mastodon was a great friend of the Kentucky Coffeetree. That beast's digestive system was so acidic that it dissolved the hard seed coating so it could germinate. Achieving similar results today requires hours of soaking in concentrated sulfuric acid.

NEW YORK STATE FAIR COMPETITIONS

The heart of the annual New York State Fair is the many different competitions held each year, although some may say its food or concerts. Each year, thousands compete in a full range of not only agricultural-focused and animal competitions but also in fine arts, photography, and arts & crafts. Many of our club members enter the Arts & Crafts competitions in one of several different categories.

In 2022, Charlie LaPrease served as the judge and was recently asked for ideas for class changes for Division T—Wood. The *book* providing rules and categories is now available <u>here</u>. It is not produced in print form. The revised classes are below. There is a Youth (ZY) Division for 17 and under and a Senior (ZS) Division for those over 65 as of March 1 this year. Other Divisions may also have classes in which you can enter, just spend some time reviewing the *book*. Don't forget to read all the rules!

Again this year, all entries must be made online. The Entry Deadline is August 2nd. Delivery of Your Projects is done on August 3rd to 5th from 9am to 4pm or by mail based on the rules detailed on the Fair website. There are no exceptions. And, when you enter, you must provide a Social Security number. Again, no exceptions. The cost to enter is \$15 plus \$2 per entry. You may enter only one project per class.

This is an EXCELLENT opportunity to showcase your projects! The club worked with the Fair to update and expand the categories and they followed through! Also, judging is done by a person who understands woodworking. It would be GREAT to have many, many entries in each class this year to show our appreciation for their willingness to update the competition!

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

TWO BIG LOSSES IN JULY

The club lost two long-time members in July. Richard (Dick) Parker passed away on July 14th at the age of 92. Shortly before, on July 10th, again at the age of 92, Ron Frey passed away. We will hold a short in memorium component at our 2023 Annual meeting for all our departing woodworkers but we thought each of these fine gentlemen deserved something in the August newsletter. Richard (Dick) Parker — Dick was a long-time member of the CNY Woodturners then Woodworkers of CNY (most recently as an honorary member). Out of Dick's backyard shed (his wife, Dorothy didn't want dust and shavings in the house), he produced some wonderful woodworking projects. He often participated in Monthly Challenges and could be counted on to provide ball-style ornaments and magnets for the *ornament sales*. He was profiled in the May 2015 Turning Times, the newsletter of the CNY Woodturners. Dick was a Korean War veteran, who



turned his love for the outdoors into a career with the NYS Park Service. His *Celebration of Life* on July 29th was a moving tribute to a man whose two mottos were

Leave It Better Than You Found It and Just Show Up

Ronald (Ron) Frey — Ron was one of the original guys that gathered at a restaurant in 1991 to form the Sawdust & Woodchips Woodworking Association, one of the 3 groups that merged in 2018 to form the Woodworkers of CNY. Charlie

remembers meetings that were held in Ron's basement shop in the early 1990s. His shop reflected his love for working with wood after receiving his degree in Industrial Arts on the GI Bill thanks to his service during the Korean War. Ron's projects were never simple as shown in his



version of a George Nakashima bench (photo). He was in awe of anyone who could turn oak, generally exclaiming that it was the *devil's wood*. But, he often made items for his church out of oak as that was the wood needed.



UPCOMING EVENT OF INTEREST MID ATLANTIC WOODTURNING SYMPOSIUM

Obtaining in-person education on one's woodworking craft is very satisfying, especially in smaller settings. While some might attend a class at one of the schools listed on page 27, others like to attend symposiums like the large annual one sponsored by the American Association of Woodturners (AAW). There are also many smaller, regional symposiums that may not be a distance away and are more

symposiums that may not be a distance away and are more intimate. *Totally Turning* held in conjunction with the Northeastern Woodworker's *Showcase* each March is one of those events. (The date for 2024 is March 23-24.) There are several others held in Virginia, North Carolina, Texas, Colorado, Illinois and other states. One fairly close by (about 4.5 hrs away) is the Mid Atlantic Woodturning Symposium held in downtown Lancaster, PA on September 22nd—24th.

Held since 2016 (except during Covid), this event brings in about 6 internationally-known turners for 1.5 days of classes. It is an event coordinated by a team of representatives from 10 area clubs. Classes are held in four different rooms on the second floor of the Marriott, Lancaster. A separate room in the center of the four teaching rooms is a small vendor show. On Sunday, a lunch is provided that always includes a special demonstration by the demonstrators as well as a silent auction and raffle. Since its inception, several members of our club have attended this symposium due to its quality demonstrators, quality setups, and excellent vendor show.

For 2023, the demonstrators may not be ones on the tip of turner's tongues — Eric Lofstrom, Neil Turner, Kristen LeVier, Simon Begg, Roberto Ferrer, and Jason Breach. However, if you visit the symposium webpage, explore the bios of each, and review the preliminary rotation schedule you will discover these are some great demonstrations they have on tap for this year.

The *club group* generally gathers for dinner on Friday and Saturday evening and *after dinner* drinks and conversation in the lobby.

Registration for the event can be done from their homepage and a link with discounted hotel rooms is also available from there.

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

Over the Bench Tool Rack


o you have a workbench in the center of your shop where there is no power outlet? Do vou often use the same tools at that workbench? Here's a great solution to solve both issues an over the bench tool rack! Use some plywood to but out a panel you can hang from a rafter and customize it to meet your needs!



Dowel Helps with Great Glue-Ups

A re you gluing up pieces to make a board for maybe turning a bowl, scrolling a project, or making a tabletop? If you use pipe clamps when gluing up a solid wood panel, it's important that the clamping pressure is centered on the thickness of the panel.

Otherwise, the panel will buckle as shown on the inset right.






One way to center the pressure is to fit a dowel that's the same diameter as the thickness of the panel between the clamp jaws and the panel. The dowel redistributes the clamping pressure, so its centered on the workpiece. The result is perfectly flat glued up panel.

MORE SHOP TIME!

Auxiliary Fence Support

Do you often need extra support when cutting with your table saw but find that the weight of your auxiliary fence causes the miter gauge to tilt and catch on the corner of the saw table? If you do, add an extension arm to the edge of the your saw table to support the miter gauge.

To make one, begin by making a T-slot from three pieces of hardwood, as in detail 'a.' Next cut a thin strip of wood to fit inside the slot and act as a rail for the extension arm.






Attach the rail to the edge of the saw table with machine screws and nylon bushings. What you're looking for is to have the extension arm flush with the table. And to get a smooth, sliding action, you can rub some wax on the rail.

Finally to keep the arm from being pushed along by the weight of the auxiliary miter fence, install a threaded insert in the arm and then a thumb screw to lock it in place.

Routing Small Pieces



When routing small pieces on a router table, how do you keep them from tipping into




the hole in the inset piece? One solution is to add an auxiliary top made of 1/8" hardboard with a hole slightly larger than the bit drilled into the top to provide clearance for the router bit. Use some double-sided tape to hold the auxiliary top in place.

Be sure to safely hold the small piece using a rubber-bottom grout trowel or make your own with a mouse pad and a block of wood!



FIXING COMMON WOODWORKING MISTAKES

Every woodworker makes a mistake sooner or later, but the good ones know how to fix them. That's what really matters. And that's what you'll get here: real-world tips for fixing your real-world woodworking problems

1. Removing Router Burn

Hard, light-colored woods such as oak and maple are great to work with in most ways, but there's a problem: both have a tendency to burn when edgerouted. And once the dark brown marks are on these woods, it's surprisingly difficult to sand them off. In fact, it's almost impossible. This is especially true when you're dealing with a complicated routed profile.

You can remove router-burned edges in a matter of seconds with this easy fix. Simply adjust the depth of cut on your router bit a smidgen deeper than the cut that burned your wood in the first place. If you take off about 1/64" to 1/32" of extra wood while moving your workpiece past the bit relatively quickly, you'll mill off all the burned wood without causing further damage.

2. Tightening Sloppy Mortise-and-Tenon Joints

Mortises and tenons are mainstays of good woodworking, but they need to fit snugly to perform right. And that doesn't always happen, especially when you're learning. If you cut a mortise-and-tenon joint that wiggles, even a little, don't just glue it up and hope for the best; you'll probably be disappointed. Instead, take the time to cut thin pieces of wood to glue and clamp to the sides of the tenon. If you orient the grain of your patch to match the grain of the undersized tenon, you'll get another shot at cutting the tenon, and the joint will still be strong.

3. Eliminating Gaps in Face Frame Joints

Face frames are the narrow pieces of wood that cap the front edges of cabinet bodies, and it's easy to miss-cut face frame rails so they don't fit tightly with their neighboring stiles. If the gap is 1/32" or less, don't toss the piece of wood into the scrap heap. Instead, get your pipe clamps out. You'd be surprised how far you can pull in a set of stiles so they fit tight and gap-free against the ends of an otherwise loose rail between them. As added insurance that these joints stay together after the clamps come off, reinforce them with 1/4" dowels. Drill a hole down the middle of the joint, swab in some glue, then tap the dowel into place. The result is an easily cut, simple tenon that helps keep rails and stiles united, even if you did need to draw them together under a bit of pressure. It's an easy way to create a kind of tiny mortise-and-tenon joint.

4 Removing Mystery Glue Smears

Some of the nastiest finishing surprises often don't appear until you're putting stain or sealer on wood. That's when hidden bits of smeared glue become very obvious, because they don't absorb finishing liquids at the same rate as the surrounding bare wood. In fact, they might not absorb any at all, leaving you with a bright, ugly and conspicuous blemish that needs attention fast. Considering some sandpaper? Forget it. If it's fine enough to be effective, it's sure to get clogged with stain or urethane after just a few strokes. No, what you need is a sharp cabinet scraper. A few scrapes will get rid of the glue, even if the area is covered in wet varnish. The resulting curls of wood are easier to clean up than sanding dust would be, plus the cleaned area will match the color of the surrounding wood more closely.

Members can apply for an educational opportunity grant whereby an individual can receive compensation toward woodturning education for expenses such as tuition, registration, travel, lodging, meals, etc. They can also apply for professional outreach program fellowship grants to encourage creative growth or research, or to provide inspiration for new directions in turned wood art. The AAW Forum is also available to members as are other restricted articles and resources on the AAW website. Members receive a discount on registration for the annual Symposium which is in Louisville, Kentucky in 2023. Check out the AAW website - www.woodturner.org.





CARVERS DEMONSTRATIONS/EVENTS

The Carvers meet in the large Community Room at the Beaver Lake Nature Center, 8477 East Mud Lake Road, Baldwinsville, NY.

The Nature Center is located west of the Village of Baldwinsville and west of Route 690 North. Mud Lake Road is about 1 3/4 miles west from the 690 exit ramp for Route 370. There is an animal hospital just past Mud Lake Road across the street. The entrance to the park is about 1/3 of a mile from your turn onto Mud Lake Road.

The entrance is on the left. Follow the roadway in, wait for the traffic arm to raise and park in either of the lots. Walk to the main building, enter, turn right, and then right again into the large room.

After meetings end, your will exit by the same roadway. If the traffic arm is down, buzz the desk and tell who answers you are with the carvers. They will lift the gate for you to drive through. There is no charge for parking.


The **fire station** is located southeast of Baldwinsville just south of the intersection of three roads—River Road, Hicks Road, and Patchett Rd.— off River Rd.

If you take Rt 370 north from John Glenn Blvd, River Rd is the first right after going across the bridge. The firehouse is 2 miles from that turn. You can also go to the traffic light on Rt 370 which is Hicks Rd, and make a turn onto Hicks (head up the hill).

If you are coming from Rt. 31, take a left onto River Rd (on the west side of Belgium Bridge), and head south about 2 miles past the new YMCA.

Please be aware that when attending meetings or events at the firehouse, DO NOT park on the grass or in front of the firehouse bay doors, or park such that others cannot enter the parking lot. If there is an alarm, the firefighters will drive right over your vehicle if it is in the way. The septic system is in the grassy areas. There is plenty of street parking. The Community Room entrance is on the north side of the building.
