The Carving Special Interest Group is sponsoring some hands-on training with Nationally known carvers, *Jim and Chris O'Dea*. They are here for two (2) days in June. Jim will also have carving supplies for sale that ALL members may take advantage of. He is expected to have the knife blanks for the June 15th club session. The times for those sales will be announced later. *Jim O'Dea* will teach attendees how to carve faces better. He will teach on 2 days, Saturday and Sunday, June 10-11. You can attend just one day or attend both days. The price (\$25) is per day and the class size is limited to 10 each day. More info about the class is below.

Chris O'Dea will teach up to 8 students how to make the Quilted Stocking on Saturday, June 10th for \$20. Details below.

Face Carving Class Info: This class is an introduction to face carving for the beginning woodcarver with little or no experience doing human faces. It is also useful to those that are not satisfied with the faces they are currently doing and those just looking for a different way. Students will have the opportunity to follow a methodology in developing a human face using just a knife. But, if you have gouges bring them ALL. Jim will show you where they can work better or faster. The emphasis of the study stick class days will be on the process, not the artistic nature of the carving. Jim does not cover very much about expression, gender differences, racial differences or anything else during this time, rather he is trying to get the student to carve a face that looks human. Practice and application can then develop the artistic nature of your carving. Attention will be paid to how you use the tools to get *clean* cuts, precise cuts, and how not to cut yourself. Each student will carve their own step-by-step study stick, with each step numbered, which will lead them through the process of *blocking* out a human face on the corner of a 11/8" square block about 12" long. Jim spreads the steps out and includes as many steps as possible to provide clarity of the step. He uses 2 of these sticks to block out the face - completing the nose and an open mouth with teeth & tongue. You will also do eyes step-by-step on another stick. Ears are done on a smaller stick especially prepared for doing ears. Four different sticks in all.

Quilted Stocking Class: The stocking is ornament size (4" x 1") and is showing in the photo. Students should bring a knife, V-tool, and woodburner with tips. There will be some tool loaners available. She will have additional blanks available for projects that use the same techniques taught in this class.







TOPS NEEDED!

Mike Vecellio provides some great instructions for making tops in two of his past columns - <u>August 2020 & March 2023</u>. Check those out!

Yes, tops can be scrolled also. There are two methods. The first is to create a compound cut spinner using a pattern from Al Baggetta that can be found <u>here</u>. The pattern is a distance down the page. He has a video of the process on YouTube <u>here</u>. The second method is to create a round disc and put a dowel with a point through the center. Any round disc can be made that is about 2-3" in diameter. A sample set of discs are in a pattern on dmidea.eu in the toys category <u>here</u>. Print the discs at about 80%. Steve Good also has one on his website <u>here</u>; search for *toy top*. As stated, any round disc can be used to create a top. No special designs need to be added. Be creative!

Finishing? The buyers love it when you add color to plain tops. Magic markers work fine! Please no glitter!

What Do I Do With Them? Bring to any meeting or event. If you can't make one, you can always drop them off at Eight Acres, just let us know you are stopping by!

The club sells about 500-600 tops during the New York State Fair to our many visitors.


All proceeds from these sales are presented to a local non-profit that provides services to children!

MIKE'S CORNER A NEW TWIST ON BOWL FROM A BOARD!

Mike Vecellio shares a variety of techniques he's learned with other members whenever possible. Here he talks about making a bowl from a board with a new twist. *Your articles are welcome always*. Please send to <u>woodcny@gmail.com</u>.

Lately, I've been making a lot of bowls from boards for my friends. This month I thought I would experiment with two different kinds of wood.

The first thing I did was cut a 11 inch square piece of sapele 7/8 inch thick. Then I took a $5\frac{1}{2}$ inch piece of maple $\frac{34}{4}$ inch thick, and carefully cut it into two 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ pieces 3/8 inch thick. A band saw works best for this cut as I only lost 1/16 of an inch from the kerf.

Then I glued the 2 halves together to make an 11 inch thin maple board. After running both pieces through my thickness sander I glued them together with as many clamps as I could find. I ended up with a two species board that was 3/16 maple and 11/16 sapele. This took longer to explain than it did to make the board. After that, I used my usual process to create a bowl from a board.

I prefer to cut the rings on the lathe as opposed to cutting on a bandsaw and gluing the half rings together. I made the first cut on a bandsaw 10 inches round. Then I mounted it on my lathe with a 2 1/8 inch recess 5/16 inch deep. I made a special tool rest with a 45 degree slot so I could use my Robert Sorby thin parting tool to cut the next 2 rings. To keep the rings from flying around after they have been parted off, I hot glued a piece of cardboard to the back. Figures 1 and 2 show the setup I used to cut the rings. I removed each ring before cutting the next one.




Figure 3 shows my ring press clamping the rings together. I glued the rings together adding 1 at a time. I, also,



let the rings set in place a few minutes so the glue will tack up and the rings won't slide around when the pressure is applied.

Beads of Courage is a non-profit organization that is dedicated to improving the quality of life for children and teens coping with serious illness, their families, and the clinicians who care for them. Children being treated for life-threatening illnesses are given beads as they undergo a variety of treatments. Boxes are one of the vessels in which they keep their beads.

The Syracuse Joslin Diabetes Center contacted the club requesting that our members make boxes for distribution to kids undergoing treatment for diabetes at the Center. They are looking for boxes of any type whether turned, scrolled, carved, or assembled using traditional woodworking. Members are encouraged to build and donate one or more boxes to fill the Center's urgent needs. Doug North, our president is managing our involvement in the program. Bring the completed boxes to meetings/other events or arrange for their receipt by Doug (<u>dnorth@twcny.rr.com</u> or 315-753-1121). We want to track and photograph each donated box.

here are some guidelines for size, finish, etc. We recently clarified the sizes so these are revised guidelines.

Wood Thickness & Weight:

• The boxes should not be heavy or bulky. Wall thicknesses should be ¼" to not more than ½". Please, not super thin and delicate.

Dimensions:

- Turned Boxes: Around 6x6" and not larger than 8x8"
- Flatwork Boxes: Not smaller than 6x6x3^{*} and not larger than 8x8x3^{*}

Base & Lids:

- Box bases should be wide enough so the box is stable & does not tip over easily
- Lids should be easy for small or ill children to remove or lift.
- Any finials should be easy for a small child to grasp and not too elaborate so they don't break

Design Consideration:

- The boxes should be able to <u>transition with the child into</u> <u>adulthood</u> and be a keepsake for many years as the patients life with the diagnosis for a lifetime.
- Avoid excessively elaborate designs that may easily break or be damaged.
- If possible, incorporate one of the *Beads of Courage* beads into the box. See Barbara at any meeting to obtain one. The club purchased the beads

Finishes:

- Please use a safe, non-toxic finish.
- Do not use finishes like linseed oil that take a long time to outgas.
- Refrain from painting the boxes. Instead, highlight the beauty of the wood with clear varnish, a stain, and/or wood burning.



Make a Box for the July Turning Challenge

OR for ANY SIG Meeting

Turned, Scrolled, Traditional Box, Whatever!!

The folks at the Joslyn Center are desperate for boxes. Please step up and make one or two (or more!). Rather than working with local hardwoods, sometimes its fun to create a project using one of the tropical hardwoods, like *Rosewood* aka the **Dalbergia** genus. But there are so may different varieties of rosewood that it can be confusing. Let's explore the species!

There are close to 300 species in the Dalbergia (aka *Rosewood*) family. Those many of us recognize and may use are:

Brazilian Rosewood East Indian Rosewood Honduran Rosewood Madagascar Rosewood

Only about a dozen species in the large genus yield rosewoods. The woods of some other species in the genus are notable in their own right:

Kingwood Brazilian Tulipwood Pau Ferro Cocobolo African Blackwood

The wood from the Rosewood tree is highly prized for its beauty, workability, and durability, which is ideal for making high-end musical instruments, flooring, furniture, and more. The fragrant oil of the wood also has many health benefits and is said to help with the healing of scars, acne, and stretch marks.

Unfortunately, those same characteristics are the reason that rosewood is on the brink of extinction. In fact, rosewoods are the <u>world's most trafficked wildlife</u> <u>product</u>, according to the UN's 2020 World Wildlife Crime Report. Their value in trade is higher than elephant ivory, rhino horn and tiger parts combined.

Generally, the Rosewoods are a deep, ruddy brown to purplish-brown color, richly streaked and tight grained with black resinous layers (*there are exceptions*). All rosewoods are strong, hard, and heavy woods. Rosewoods have an attractive wood grain and are highly resistant to wear and tear. They take a fine polish but because of its resinous nature can be difficult to work.

When working with the Rosewoods (including when sanding), some people experience a variety of symptoms as the rosewood dust is known to be a sensitizing irritant. It can trigger asthma and other respiratory ailments. For this reason, take extra care when working with Rosewoods and similar woods in the Dalbergia species

The heartwood attains large dimensions, but squared logs or planks are never seen because before the tree arrives at maturity, the heartwood begins to decay, making it faulty and hollow at the center.

Rosewood trees grow in the tropical areas pf South America and Central America as well as similar areas in Southeast Asia.

Fun Facts:

• The Chinese revere rosewood and have used it to make exquisite furniture since the 16th-Century Ming Dynasty. China still ranks as the world's largest consumer of rosewood.







New York State Fair Competitions

The heart of the annual New York State Fair is competitions although some may say its food or concerts. Each year, thousands compete in a full range of not only agricultural-focused and animal competitions but also in fine arts, photography, and arts & crafts. Many of our club members enter the Arts & Crafts competitions in one of several different categories.

In 2022, Charlie LaPrease served as the judge and was recently asked for ideas for category changes. Several were suggested. Until the final "classes" are published, we won't know what the final classes are. We expect to provide updates going forward. Again this year, all entries must be made online. Stay tuned.

CRAFTS FOR CHARITY 2023 CRAWFISH FESTIVAL

The club was asked to participate as a craft vendor on Saturday, May 6th at the 2023 Crawfish Festival sponsored by Operation Northern Comfort. Since we are a non-profit selling to benefit local children's charities, they provided us with two free spaces from which we could sell crafts. The crafts we sell are all donated by our members / artists.

Just five people helped with the sale. Many thanks go to Charlie LaPrease, Elaine Negrotto, Arlene Schlueter, Rod Castle (partial day), and Barbara Raymond-LaPrease for their work.

We had a great spot just inside the drained Clinton Square fountain. The day was sunny and quite warm for early May. There were crowds throughout the day attending the Festival. We had no idea how the day would go but after getting setup with 2 tents and much of our product, we sold about \$100 of product per hour for the first 5 hours. Most of the sales were via credit card so we were charged \$10.73 in fees. In the end, the charities account received \$599.27.

Sander Platform

Do you hate having to wait for your palm or orbital sander to stop vibrating before setting it down?

Make a sanding platform like the one shown in the photo! Use a piece of hardboard with a few scrap pieces glued to the top to create a "holding pen". Glue a piece of carpet to the hardboard inside the "fenced in" area.

Sit the platform on your workbench or clamp it down as necessary. The carpet absorbs the vibrations of the sander and its it from jumping off the bench!

A side benefit ... the carpet fibers help clean dust and debris off the sandpaper!

Finding the Center of a Circle


An easy way to find the center of a large circle is with a framing square and a simple jig made from a scrap piece.


To make the jig, cut a strip of wood that's a little shorter than the circle's diameter. Then, drill holes 1" from each end and centered on the jig's width. Measure and mark the centerline of the jig's length. Slip a nail in each hole in the jig and place it against the circle.


Lay a framing square against the jig, lined up with the center mark. Draw a line on the circle along the edge of the square. Move the jig about a quarter of the way around the circle and draw a second line with the square. The intersection of the 2 lines is the center of the circle.

"Cheap" Miter Saw Cart!

N eed a stand for your miter saw? The metal frame of an old gas grill iw a option, especially if it has wheels. Clean up the stand and paint the frame. Then, build a couple of table supports that fit your saw. Make sure they are flush with the surface of the miter saw table. In the photo, there Is an added pull-out bind to hold short cut-offs!


Installing Hinges on Small Boxes

A re you making a Beads of Courage box with a hinged lid? Here is a great tip to use! One solution is to use hot-melt glue to temporarily fasten the hinge to the lid. The only problem is the glue often dries before you can align the lid on the box.

Start by screwing one leaf of the hinge to the box. Then use hot-melt glue to attach small scrap blocks to the front and sides of the lid, as shown in the drawing. *Note*: These scrap blocks should stick down past the bottom of the lid so they'll fit snugly around the box.

After shimming the leaf of the hinge with a piece of cardboard, apply a dab of hot-melt glue (*detail 'a'*). Then quickly fit the blocks on the lid down over the box. When you open the lid, the leaf of the hinge will be stuck in its proper location, and it's easy to mark the mounting holes (*detail 'b'*)





Padded Tray Saves Tools

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
S ome people like to store their tools on their lathe that is until they roll off and hit the floor, dulling or even breaking the cutting edge. Why not build yourself a tray like the one in the drawing to avoid the

drops!> Be sure to add a cleat that fits your lathe bed channel to hold the tray in place. For the inside of the tray, use some sort of nonskid foam or other

material and double-face tape it to the tray. A secondary option is to add PVC plastic pipe cut in half to your tool tray as shown in the second drawing.



Ebonizing Wood

When you ebonize wood, you make the wood turn a grey or black. The results you get will depend on the solution you make, the brands of products you use, and the type of wood.

To make your ebonize solution, you need:

A Mason Jar A Steel Wood Pad Apple Cider Vinegar

Insert the steel wood pad in the Mason jar and cover the pad with cider vinegar. Let stand for 24 hours. Once ready, remove and discard the steel woold pad.

Brush the solution onto the wood to blacken the wood. If too dark, wait until it dries and apply a light coat of tinted varnish before applying your finish.

2023 NEW YORK STATE FAIR DEMONSTRATIONS

The Woodworkers of Central New York conduct demonstrations of various non-electrified woodworking techniques inside the Witter Agricultural Museum during all 13 days of the New York State Fair. We have about a 300 square foot space in which we demonstrate. In that space we demo using the club's workbench, spring pole lathe, and treadle lathe, the shaving horse, and on Barbara's 146 year-old treadle scrollsaw. Our carvers demo their skills and we hope that Martin Meiss will be demonstrating his hand tool skills while building some stools and such. Kenn Pickard will be demonstrating basketweaving. Terry Dote will be demonstrating inlay and veneering for four days.

WHAT ELSE WILL BE DEMO'D? I hope to hear from more of you, our members who will volunteer their time and skills, making suggestions for demonstrations.

WHY DO WE DEMONSTRATE AT THE FAIR?

- To educate the public about woodworking, focused on how it was done 100 or so years ago.
- To promote the club.
- To add cash to our educational fund (including a new scholarship program to be announced soon) via the fine woodworking raffle.
- To earn money for 1 or 2 local charities through the sale of tops.
- It's fun! [Yes it is!]

As a side benefit, this event educates our own members on techniques they may never encounter otherwise because they have the opportunity to be with other demonstrators.

The 2023 Fair starts on WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 23 AND ENDS ON LABOR DAY, SEPTEMBER 4. The Museum officially opens at 10am and we are still waiting to hear if we close at 7 or 8pm. Volunteers may work the whole day or part of the day. You DO NOT NEED to demonstrate to participate in this event. There are MANY roles that need to be filled that don't include demonstrating. In fact, many past volunteers learn so much and have so much fun, they come back a second day after helping for one.

NEW FOR 2023 ... Both Barbara and Charlie will need to be replaced 3 days with what are called "day captains". These people will handle the booth during the day, working with staff to schedule time on equipment and breaks, handle the raffle and tops cash, and address issues as they arise. A shift can be split between 2 people — one working the early hours and one handling the later hours.

The Woodworkers of CNY was formed in September 2017, to combine the three existing woodworking groups in Central New York into one consolidated entity. Four *Committees of the Corporation* (aka Special Interest Groups) focus member's attention on three specific genres carving, scrolling, & turning—as well as the broader, all-encompassing general woodworking area. Members may attend any of the meetings at no additional charge (unless there is a project or speaker charge). The Woodworkers of CNY was reaccepted as a chapter of the American Association of Woodturners (AAW) in May 2018. We encourage you to join AAW as it is an excellent organization with great resources as a member. Membership in AAW costs either \$56 for an online only or \$68 for a paper-based membership. Each membership includes the 6 issues of the journal, American Woodturner, with the online membership receiving it only online. You also have access to a large collection of online resources such as the publication AAW Fundamentals which is published on the off months from the journal.

AAW OF WOODTURNERS

AAW is an international organization of over 14,000 members of varying woodturning skills. In addition to receiving current issues of the journal, American Woodturner, membership also provides online access to all past issues of the Journal from 1986 forward. Access to a Resource Directory is also available only to members. Members of AAW also receive savings of up to 50% on AAW merchandise, including project books, DVDs, logo apparel, and more. Members can apply for an educational opportunity grant whereby an individual can receive compensation toward woodturning education for expenses such as tuition, registration, travel, lodging, meals, etc. They can also apply for professional outreach program fellowship grants to encourage creative growth or research, or to provide inspiration for new directions in turned wood art. The AAW Forum is also available to members as are other restricted articles and resources on the AAW website. Members receive a discount on registration for the annual Symposium which is in Louisville, Kentucky in 2023. Check out the AAW website - www.woodturner.org.




