igcap everal members of the club attended either or both the Depyrography demonstration on Friday evening, April 21<sup>st</sup> or the workshop on Saturday afternoon, April 22<sup>nd</sup>. Both sessions were led by Sandra Sabene of the Liverpool Arts Center. The demonstration with 22 attendees was held at the Center in Liverpool. There were many questions, answers, ah-ha moments, and discussion. Saturday afternoon 17 members gathered at the Martville Pathfinder Studio retreat location for an afternoon workshop. 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## LOCATION FOR WOODWORKING & TURNING

#### CANTON WOODS SENIOR CENTER, 76 CANTON STREET, BALDWINSVILLE

The Senior Center is a facility that provides a variety of activities and for area seniors. Residents living in the Towns of Lysander and Van Buren (including the Village) may join for free. There is a small fee for others. *Meals on Wheels* for the area runs out of this facility. Seniors may also benefit from Peace lunches and other programs that are provided.

# MIKE'S CORNER SEAM RIPPERS!

Mike Vecellio shares a variety of techniques he's learned with other members whenever possible. Here he talks about making seam rippers. *Your articles are welcome anytime*. Please send to <u>woodcny@gmail.com</u>.

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f you would like a simple but rewarding project you might want to try creating a seam ripper. My family has quite a few quilters and others that sew, so when my wife, the quilter, asked me to make her a few I went to work. She knew that they could be made because my friend, *Doug North*, had made her one.

I headed to my favorite website to buy kits – <u>Exotic Blanks</u> – to see what kits they had to offer. It seems that they have a few types so I ordered the ones that have an stiletto (awl) on one side and a seam ripper on the other.

These are actually Penn State Industries kits, but Exotic Blanks sells them at the same price. If you buy 10 or more you get a discount. Also, you get a bag of peanut M&Ms with your order! What more could you want?

Figure 1 (*top right*) shows what comes in the kit. There is a 3½ inch 8mm tube, the stiletto (awl) and ripper ends, and two retaining springs.

The blank preparation is exactly the same a preparing a single tube pen blank.

**IMPORTANT TIP:** Lately when I drill with my 8mm bit, I noticed the hole is too small for the 8mm tube. This is true for my 8mm pens also. To compensate for this, I ream out the hole with an 8.37mm bit that is also known as a *P-size* bit. I am not sure why this is happening. My guess is that by drilling on the lathe the hole is so precise a little wiggle room is needed. A secondary drilling/reaming is also a good idea if you are planning on painting the inside of a translucent acrylic blank.

Turning and finishing the blank is also the same as a single tube pen blank. For wooden blanks I use <u>Gluboost</u> CA glue for the finish.

There are only two steps in assembling the kit. First, make sure there is no glue or other residue inside the tube. Next, the retaining springs need to be inserted into the ends of the tube.

The first one I did was a little tricky, but after assembling one, it was easy. You need to squeeze the retaining ring into a small round circle being careful not to crease it. Then insert it into the end at least  $\frac{2}{3}$  to  $\frac{3}{4}$  of the way into the tube before you let go. Make sure you insert the solid end first. Then, finish pressing it into the end flush.

People must have been putting the wrong end in first because at the bottom of the instructions it says:

"If the ripper assembly is held by the spring when the ripper is out, but but does not stay when the ripper is being stored inside, then you ignored the multiple times this instruction said to insert the solid side of the spring first."

Figure 2 (*bottom right*) shows four(4) seam rippers that I made for my wife and relatives.

This is a fun project for both beginning and advanced turners looking for a simple project to score points with a sewer! Page 5

The Carving Special Interest Group is sponsoring some hands-on training with Nationally known carvers, *Jim and Chris O'Dea*. They are here for two (2) days in June. Jim will also have carving supplies for sale that ALL members may take advantage of. He is expected to have the knife blanks for the June 15<sup>th</sup> club session. The times for those sales will be announced later.

*Jim O'Dea* will teach attendees how to carve faces better. He will teach on 2 days, Saturday and Sunday, June 10-11. You can attend just one day or attend both days. The price (\$25) is per day and the class size is limited to 10 each day. More info about the class is below.


*Chris O'Dea* will teach up to 8 students how to make the Quilted Stocking on Saturday, June 10<sup>th</sup> for \$20. Details below.

Face Carving Class Info: This class is an introduction to face carving for the beginning woodcarver with little or no experience doing human faces. It is also useful to those that are not satisfied with the faces they are currently doing and those just looking for a different way. Students will have the opportunity to follow a methodology in developing a human face using just a knife. But, if you have gouges bring them ALL. Jim will show you where they can work better or faster. The emphasis of the study stick class days will be on the process, not the artistic nature of the carving. Jim does not cover very much about expression, gender differences, racial differences or anything else during this time, rather he is trying to get the student to carve a face that looks human. Practice and application can then develop the artistic nature of your carving. Attention will be paid to how you use the tools to get *clean* cuts, precise cuts, and how not to cut yourself. Each student will carve their own step-by-step study stick, with each step numbered, which will lead them through the process of *blocking* out a human face on the corner of a 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" square block about 12" long. Jim spreads the steps out and includes as many steps as possible to provide clarity of the step. He uses 2 of these sticks to block out the face - completing the nose and an open mouth with teeth & tongue. You will also do eyes step-by-step on another stick. Ears are done on a smaller stick especially prepared for doing ears. Four different sticks in all.

**Quilted Stocking Class:** The stocking is ornament size (4" x 1") and is showing in the photo. Students should bring a knife, V-tool, and woodburner with tips. There will be some tool loaners available. She will have additional blanks available for projects that use the same techniques taught in this class.







# TOPS NEEDED!

Mike Vecellio provides some great instructions for making tops in two of his past columns - <u>August 2020 & March 2023</u>. Check those out!

Yes, tops can be scrolled also. There are two methods. The first is to create a compound cut spinner using a pattern from Al Baggetta that can be found <u>here</u>. The pattern is a distance down the page. He has a video of the process on YouTube <u>here</u>. The second method is to create a round disc and put a dowel with a point through the center. Any round disc can be made that is about 2-3" in diameter. A sample set of discs are in a pattern on dmidea.eu in the toys category <u>here</u>. Print the discs at about 80%. Steve Good also has one on his website <u>here</u>; search for *toy top*. As stated, any round disc can be used to create a top. No special designs need to be added. Be creative!

**Finishing?** The buyers love it when you add color to plain tops. Magic markers work fine! Please no glitter!

What Do I Do With Them? Bring to any meeting or event. If you can't make one, you can always drop them off at Eight Acres, just let us know you are stopping by!

#### WOOD EDUCATION - DOGWOOD

**S** pring brings out the flowering trees, some of which can take your breath away . One such tree is the dogwood.

**Dogwood** (*Cornus florida*) is grown in eastern North America. It is a beautiful and versatile ornamental tree, the most popular species being the Flowering Dogwood. This species is known for its stunning white to light yellow flowers. There are also species that have a variety of pink flowers. Grown best in dappled shade areas where taller shade trees provide protection from direct sun rays, they can add interest to your landscape if given enough water to grow.

Most boards and blanks produced from dogwood are composed primarily of sapwood rather than heartwood. Narrow heartwood is a reddish brown. Wide sapwood is cream to pale pinkish in color. The wood, unlike the flowers, has no characteristic odor.

The wood of the flowering dogwood has a reputation for its toughness and shock resistance. Stiff and finely textured, the wood weighs as much as hickory, yet it is harder! When used as a chisel handle, dogwood resists crushing and mushrooming from hammer blows. Its toughness is appreciated in a variety of applications, though its poor dimensional stability means that its use is usually restricted to unglued/ unjoined standalone components where it's expansion and contraction

can occur freely.

Flowering dogwood is a small deciduous tree growing to 33ft tall, often wider than it is tall when mature, with a trunk diameter of up to 1ft). A 10-year-old tree will stand about 16ft) tall. The leaves are opposite, simple, ovate, 2.4-5.1in) long and 1.6-2.4in) broad that turn a rich redbrown in fall.

Flowering dogwood attains its greatest size and growth potential in the Upper South, sometimes up to 40 feet in height. At the northern end of its range, heights of 30-33 feet are more typical. Hot, humid summer weather is necessary for new growth to harden off in the fall.

The flowers are individually small, with four, greenish-yellow petals. Around 20 flowers are produced in a dense, rounded flower-head. The flower-head is surrounded by four conspicuous large white, pink or red bracts (*not petals*).

The fruit is a cluster of two to ten separate drupes which ripen in the late summer and the early fall to a bright red, or occasionally yellow with a rosy blush. They are an important food source for dozens of species of birds, which then distribute the seeds

# BEADS OF COURAGE BOXES

**Beads of Courage** is a non-profit organization that is dedicated to improving the quality of life for children and teens coping with serious illness, their families, and the clinicians who care for them. Children being treated for life-threatening illnesses are given beads as they undergo a variety of treatments. Boxes are one of the vessels in which they keep their beads.

The Syracuse Joslin Diabetes Center contacted the club requesting that our members make boxes for distribution to kids undergoing treatment for diabetes at the Center. They are looking for boxes of any type whether turned, scrolled, carved, or assembled using traditional woodworking. Members are encouraged to build and donate one or more boxes to fill the Center's urgent needs. Doug North, our president is managing our involvement in the program. Bring the completed boxes to meetings/other events or arrange for their receipt by Doug (<u>dnorth@twcny.rr.com</u> or 315-753-1121). We want to track and photograph each donated box.

here are some guidelines for size, finish, etc. We recently clarified the sizes so these are revised guidelines.

#### Wood Thickness & Weight:

• The boxes should not be heavy or bulky. Wall thicknesses should be ¼" to not more than ½". Please, not super thin and delicate.

#### Dimensions:

- Turned Boxes: Around 6x6" and not larger than 8x8"
- Flatwork Boxes: Not smaller than 6x6x3" and not larger than 8x8x3"

#### Base & Lids:

- Box bases should be wide enough so the box is stable & does not tip over easily
- Lids should be easy for small or ill children to remove or lift.
- Any finials should be easy for a small child to grasp and not too elaborate so they don't break

#### Design Consideration:

- The boxes should be able to <u>transition with the child into</u> <u>adulthood</u> and be a keepsake for many years as the patients life with the diagnosis for a lifetime.
- Avoid excessively elaborate designs that may easily break or be damaged.
- If possible, incorporate one of the *Beads of Courage* beads into the box. See Barbara at any meeting to obtain one. The club purchased the beads

#### Finishes:

- Please use a safe, non-toxic finish.
- Do not use finishes like linseed oil that take a long time to outgas.
- Refrain from painting the boxes. Instead, highlight the beauty of the wood with clear varnish, a stain, and/or wood burning.





The folks at the Joslyn Center are desperate for boxes. Please step up and make one or two (or more!).


## Foldable Watercolor Set

The price? About \$20.00. There are a couple on Amazon with this one by Artsy having 3 brushes. You can also purchase other brush sets of different sizes.





# **Dowel Cutting Jig**



Many of us use dowels in our woodworking projects. Cutting small pieces of dowels to the right length can be tricky, if not dangerous. This tip presents a jig that safely solves the problem. Here's a jig that will make "short work" of accurately cutting dowels into small pieces with a hand saw. It can be used on three common sizes of dowels (1/4", 3/8" and 1/2"). And the dowels are cut without any splintering, in lengths from 1/4" to 2" long. Best of all, the jig is easy to make and it has just two parts: a hardwood body and a hardboard stop that pivots on a screw.

To make the jig, first drill three holes along the edge of the body. Then cut the kerfs out with a back saw. Each kerf is labeled so you can quickly establish the length of the dowel you want to cut. Then attach the stop to the jig with a woodscrew.






# More Shop Time!

## Low Tech Drill Guide!

f you count speed, accuracy, and convenience important in your shop, a drill press fits the description. But you can still get good results with a hand-held drill as well.

To do this, you can cut multiple drill guide blocks from a length of 2x2 with grooves (to match drill bit diameters) cut in opposite faces (see *Figure 1*). By keeping the bit captive on three sides, the block all but guarantees correct alignment. The end of the block can also act as a depth stop against a bit collar or the drill chuck itself.

After cutting the blocks, the key to getting accurate holes is to locate a sharp brad-point bit at the hole center. Then, move your drill guide block into position (see *Figure 2*). Snugging the guide block up against the drill bit automatically aligns the bit for straight drilling. And using a stop collar lets you cut a hole at the desired depth (see *Figure 3*).



# Miter Joint Corner Clamp


**G**luing a miter joint is a challenge. There just isn't an easy way to clamp it. The store-bought clamps didn't always pull the joint together. Here's a shop-built corner clamp that uses wedges to push (or press) the mitered pieces in place.

Looking at the photo at the right and drawing below, you can see that this corner clamp uses a piece of plywood as a base. Then a square block and two cleats are glued and screwed on top.

What's important here is that the inside corner of the square block is

exactly 90°. Then align the inside edge of each cleat parallel with the inside edges of the block.

A pair of wedges sized to fit between the workpiece and the cleat does all the work. They apply pressure in two directions at the same time. When the inside wedge (the one contacting the mitered piece) is tapped forward, it pushes the joint tighter together and firmly holds the pieces in place while the glue dries.





#### QUICK TIP: FINISH PROTECTOR

**E** ver have a finely sanded or finished surface disfigured by just a slip of a screwdriver? It need not happen again if you remember this trick. Simply drill a hole the exact size of the screwdriver you're using in a piece of thin stock (1/4" plywood works well for this), and then clamp it in place over each hole before you begin fastening.

## **Flattening Waterstones**

t's hard to beat the fast-cutting action of a waterstone for sharpening chisels and other tools. The price you pay, however, is periodic maintenance. Sanding screens are a great way to flatten a waterstone. But what can you do when you're in a hurry and don't want to deal with the mess of using a screen and water?


Here's a quick, easy way to flatten a waterstone in a pinch. Find a cement block (or even a step) that's relatively flat. Then sprinkle water on the rough face of the block and scrub the stone back and forth a few times. You'll get a passable cutting edge in no time.

## **Putty Trick**



Before even picking up the hammer and nails, first apply a strip of masking tape. Then nail and set the heads like you normally would.

Finally, force the putty into the holes and remove the tape. The small *bump* of putty that remains can be easily sanded away.

The Woodworkers of CNY was formed in September 2017, to combine the three existing woodworking groups in Central New York into one consolidated entity. Four *Committees of the Corporation* (aka Special Interest Groups) focus member's attention on three specific genres carving, scrolling, & turning—as well as the broader, all-encompassing general woodworking area. Members may attend any of the meetings at no additional charge (unless there is a project or speaker charge). The Woodworkers of CNY was reaccepted as a chapter of the American Association of Woodturners (AAW) in May 2018. We encourage you to join AAW as it is an excellent organization with great resources as a member. Membership in AAW costs either \$56 for an online only or \$68 for a paper-based membership. Each membership includes the 6 issues of the journal, American Woodturner, with the online membership receiving it only online. You also have access to a large collection of online resources such as the publication AAW Fundamentals which is published on the off months from the journal.

# AAW OF WOODTURNERS

AAW is an international organization of over 14,000 members of varying woodturning skills. In addition to receiving current issues of the journal, American Woodturner, membership also provides online access to all past issues of the Journal from 1986 forward. Access to a Resource Directory is also available only to members. Members of AAW also receive savings of up to 50% on AAW merchandise, including project books, DVDs, logo apparel, and more. Members can apply for an educational opportunity grant whereby an individual can receive compensation toward woodturning education for expenses such as tuition, registration, travel, lodging, meals, etc. They can also apply for professional outreach program fellowship grants to encourage creative growth or research, or to provide inspiration for new directions in turned wood art. The AAW Forum is also available to members as are other restricted articles and resources on the AAW website. Members receive a discount on registration for the annual Symposium which is in Louisville, Kentucky in 2023. Check out the AAW website - www.woodturner.org.



#### **CARVERS DEMONSTRATIONS/EVENTS**

There is an animal hospital just past Mud Lake Road across the street. The entrance to the park is about 1/3 of a mile from your turn onto Mud Lake Road. The entrance is on the left. Follow the roadway in, wait for the traffic arm to raise and park in either of the lots. Walk to the main building, enter, turn right, and then right again into the large room.

After meetings end, your will exit by the same roadway. If the traffic arm is down, buzz the desk and tell who answers you are with the carvers. They will lift the gate for you to drive through. There is no charge for parking.

The Center is in the Village but on the south side of the River off Downer Street which is Rt 31.


From Rt 690 North/South, you take the exit for Downer St/Route 31 and
