A group of counters (we need volunteers) will then count the votes.

Furniture — Items that typically sit on a floor

Large Accessories — Larger Boxes, Wall Hung or Tabletop Mirrors, Clocks, Shelf Items, Frames, & Lamps – Dimensions more than a cubic foot

Small Accessories — Smaller Boxes, Wall Hung or Tabletop Mirrors, Clocks, Shelf Items, Frames, & Lamps – Dimensions less than 12" x 12" x 12" (a cubic foot)

Wearable Accessories — Jewelry, Hair Pieces, Belts and other wearable items created in any way

Scrolled — Items made primarily with a scrollsaw

Turned Spindles — Turned items that are primarily created in the spindle style between centers

Turned Bowls — Turned items that are primarily created as a bowl

Charlie will hold workshops in both November and December for those that need some help or just want to turn with other members. The Woodworkers of Central New York (WWCNY) continues to attract members from near and far. Since the New York State Fair, we've received new memberships from 25 people so our total membership is over 300! 

One of the missions of the Woodworkers of Central New York is to contribute to the community in which we live, practice our craft, and enjoy. The annual *Turn for Troops* project is one of the community projects that helps to fulfill that mission. When you participate in this effort, not only are you enjoying practicing your craft — in this case turning — but you also support the men and women who protect us through their military service.

For those new to this project, let's explain. Woodcraft sponsors this national effort where volunteers turn pens. These pens are in turn sent to military personnel serving overseas and in rehabilitation centers. When there is a Woodcraft store nearby, the volunteers go to the store — usually on Veterans Day — to produce the pens. For clubs like ours that don't have a local store, they supply

pen components and (if needed) bushings for clubs to hold their own *Turn-a-Thon*, whether it is as a group or individually at home. 2023 is the 20th year for this program.

For the past 9 years, members of our club participated in the program donating 2500 pens they turned. Photos of completed pens are shown on the website under the tab *Community Support*.

Make a Box & Bring to ANY SIG Meeting or Event

Turned, Scrolled, Traditional Box, Whatever!!

The folks at the Joslyn Center are desperate for boxes. Please step up and make one or two (or more!).

BEADS OF COURAGE BOXES

Beads of Courage is a non-profit organization that is dedicated to improving the quality of life for children and teens coping with serious illness, their families, and the clinicians who care for them. Children being treated for life-threatening illnesses are given beads as they undergo a variety of treatments. Boxes are one of the vessels in which they keep their beads.

The Syracuse Joslin Diabetes Center contacted the club requesting that our members make boxes for distribution to kids undergoing treatment for diabetes at the Center. They are looking for boxes of any type whether turned, scrolled, carved, or assembled using traditional woodworking. Members are encouraged to build and donate one or more boxes to fill the Center's urgent needs. Doug North, our president is managing our involvement in the program. Bring the completed boxes to meetings/other events or arrange for their receipt by Doug (dnorth@twcny.rr.com or 315-753-1121). We want to track and photograph each donated box.

There are some guidelines for size, finish, etc. We recently clarified the sizes so these are revised guidelines.

Wood Thickness & Weight:

• The boxes should not be heavy or bulky. Wall thicknesses should be ¼" to not more than ½". Please, not super thin and delicate.

Dimensions

- ♦ Turned Boxes: Around 6x6" and not larger than 8x8"
- ♦ Flatwork Boxes: Not smaller than 6x6x3" and not larger than 8x8x3"

Base & Lids:

- Box bases should be wide enough so the box is stable & does not tip over easily
- Lids should be easy for small or ill children to remove or lift.
- Any finials should be easy for a small child to grasp and not too elaborate so they don't break

Design Consideration:

- The boxes should be able to <u>transition with the child into adulthood</u> and be a keepsake for many years as the patients life with the diagnosis for a lifetime.
- Avoid excessively elaborate designs that may easily break or be damaged.
- ♦ If possible, incorporate one of the *Beads of Courage* beads into the box. See Barbara at any meeting to obtain one. The club purchased the beads

Finishes:

- Please use a safe, non-toxic finish.
- Do not use finishes like linseed oil that take a long time to outgas.
- Refrain from painting the boxes. Instead, highlight the beauty of the wood with clear varnish, a stain, and/or wood burning.

CARVING DECEMBER MEETING

The normal date for the Carving SIG meeting is the 3rd Thursday of the month. For December, that would put the meeting on the 21st. Those at the October meeting asked that the date be moved up to the 14th. Gary reports that the room is not available so there will be no December gathering. Instead, he encourages all members to attend the Sunday afternoon, December 3rd Holiday Party at the fire house. It's a great time to get to know members other than carvers!

A UNIQUE ORNAMENT CHALLENGE

The club will again participate in the international ornament challenge coordinated by Alan Stratton, the man who runs the website <u>AsWoodTurns</u> and Matt Deighton of Woodturners Worldwide. This will be the second year the club will participate after coming in third in 2022 with 42 entries by 14 members. For our efforts, we received a remote demonstration from Alan in June on *N-Loop Celtic Knots*. For 2023, Doug set the goal of submitting at least 150 different entries.

Why Should We Participate? For the club, Mr. Stratton provides a remote demonstration (free to us) for the 3 clubs with the most members who enter the contest! For individuals, there are 4 grand prizes from \$100 to \$250. There are also a variety of vendor sponsors offering coupons and discounts to everyone submitting an ornament!

This Challenge is unique in that it embraces our <u>very diverse membership</u> in that <u>ANY CRAFT</u> is welcome and <u>ANY MEDIA</u> is welcome! We have over 300 members that can create ornaments using a diversity of mediums and methods!

What Are the Rules?

- Must be in good taste
- Reflect the spirit of Christmas and/or the Christmas season. Non-Christian ornaments are welcome.
- Any craft is welcome.
- Any media is welcome.
- Ornaments must have been made for this season. For example, if you made it years ago, please do not submit it.
- Anyone can submit ornaments!
- You may submit up to 5 ornaments!
- We will highlight your ornament in multiple videos. Your submission is your consent.

Some Thoughts on Photographing Your Ornament — Many of our members create 3D ornaments and we want to show all sides to the ornament. The rule is you can only submit 1 photo per ornament. However, you can show multiple views of an ornament by combining multiple pictures into one using photo editing software. Several phones can do this. If you need help, reach out to fellow tech-savvy members. Also, be sure to use a PLAIN background and crop the photo to show just the ornament!

Entering — They simplified the entry process for this year! Go https://www.aswoodturns.com/challenges/. Below the video (feel free to watch), there is a green box with a web address in white. That web address is HERE but I suggest you link from the webpage noted above. Click on the link and fill out the form then hit SUBMIT. You MUST enter the name of the club so we get credit and that name is Woodworkers of CNY. We must get that correct when submitting so all of our ornaments are counted properly!



The Entry Deadline is Midnight on November 30th.

CLUB CHARITABLE EFFORTS

The mission of the Woodworkers CNY is both social and educational and includes activities and programs:

- (1) To advance the art and craft of woodworking in all its forms;
- (2) To share knowledge, skill, and experience regarding woodworking;
- (3) To explore new methods and techniques for advancing woodworking as an art and craft; and
- (4) To contribute to the general community through educational programs and community services.

Our support to the community is handled by a variety of projects including toy donations for underprivileged kids for 30 years, crafts for charities since 2004, demonstrations during the NYS Fair for over 20 years, selling tops for charity at the NYS Fair for about 10 years, turning pens for troops for now 10 years, creating Beads of Courage boxes for now 2 years*, as well as other projects. Many of our charitable work is focused on organizations that help kids with financial donations going to the Golisano Children's Hospital as it was being built, the Ronald McDonald House as it was built, the Upstate Cancer Center as it was built, and others.

* The turners made 20 or so boxes in 2016 but could not find a local organization who would take them. The Joslyn Center contacted Doug in late 2022 and will take any we can make.

CRAFTS FOR CHARITIES - MANLIUS EVENT

Our Crafts for Charity events provide funds for yearly donations, providing about \$60,000 since its inception in 2004. Last year we donated \$4,646 to two charities from our sales. Our last sale was at the Manlius Historical Society's Artisan Fair on October 27 and 28. As a result of that sale, our total for 2023 is \$2,137. While about half of our 2022 proceeds because we pulled out of the Harvest Festival due to weather, its still an acceptable donation. The Board will identify the recipients of that money at its November 15th meeting. Thanks to all who helped out with this event, especially Tony Scime who came from Buffalo and cut reindeer both days. Photos are below.

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WOOD EDUCATION - EASTERN REDBUD

Luchsia flowers in the spring announce the presence of the Eastern Redbud (*Cercis canadensis*) in the landscape. Also known as the American Judas Tree, this large deciduous shrub or small tree will likely not produce large wood for the woodworker but it sure looks good when it is flowering!

Native to eastern North America, this deciduous, ornamental tree is also the state tree of Oklahoma. In optimum conditions, the tree may grow up to 20-30 feet tall and 20-25 feet wide. It is a smaller tree with a nearly flat or rounded crown that is often found growing beneath taller trees. It generally has a short, often twisted trunk and spreading branches.

The flowers appear in clusters and are light to dark magenta pink in color. The fruit are flattened, dry, brown, pea-like pods that mature in the fall. The leaves are alternate, simple, heart-shaped, 2-5 inches long

The heartwood ranges from a golden brown to a darker reddish brown, sometimes with a streaked appearance. It can have a greenish olive cast when freshly sawn. The colors tend to darken and redden over time. The pale white sapwood is clearly demarcated from the heartwood. The grain is medium to fine texture and straight. It is easy to work, with no characteristic odor.

Fun Facts:

- ♦ The flowers can be eaten fresh or fried.
- The green twigs are often used to season wild game such as venison or opossum.
- ◆ Native Americans consumed the flowers raw or boiled and ate roasted seeds.
- Columbus, WI is known as Redbud City and hosts Redbud Day recognizing the tree annually on Saturday before Mother's Day.
- ◆ The genus name Cercis means weaver's shuttle in Greek, referring to its seed pods that resemble the size and shape of a weaver's shuttle for looms.
- The early blossoms draw in nectar-seeking insects and many birds.
- George Washington reported in his diary on many occasions about the beauty of the tree and transplanted seedlings from the nearby forest into his garden



WOODWORKING TECHNIQUES FIXING COMMON MISTAKES

Every woodworker makes a mistake sooner or later, but the good ones know how to fix them. That's what really matters. And that's what you'll get here: real-world tips for fixing your real-world woodworking problems.

1. Removing Router Burn

Hard, light-colored woods such as oak and maple are great to work with in most ways, but there's a problem: both have a tendency to burn when edge-routed. And once the dark brown marks are on these woods, it's surprisingly difficult to sand them off. In fact, it's almost impossible. This is especially true when you're dealing with a complicated routed profile.

You can remove router-burned edges in a matter of seconds with this easy fix. Simply adjust the depth of cut on your router bit a smidgen deeper than the cut that burned your wood in the first place. If you take off about 1/64" to 1/32" of extra wood while moving your workpiece past the bit relatively quickly, you'll mill off all the burned wood without causing further damage.


2. Tightening Sloppy Mortise-and-Tenon Joints

Mortises and tenons are mainstays of good woodworking, but they need to fit snugly to perform right. And that doesn't always happen, especially when you're learning. If you cut a mortise-and-tenon joint that wiggles, even a little, don't just glue it up and hope for the best; you'll probably be disappointed. Instead, take the time to cut thin pieces of wood to glue and clamp to the sides of the tenon. If you orient the grain of your patch to match the grain of the undersized tenon, you'll get another shot at cutting the tenon, and the joint will still be strong.

3. Eliminating Gaps in Face Frame Joints

Face frames are the narrow pieces of wood that cap the front edges of cabinet bodies, and it's easy to miss-cut face frame rails so they don't fit tightly with their neighboring stiles. If the gap is 1/32" or less, don't toss the piece of wood into the scrap heap. Instead, get your pipe

clamps out. You'd be surprised how far you can pull in a set of stiles so they fit tight and gap-free against the ends of an otherwise loose rail between them. As added insurance that these joints stay together after the clamps come off, reinforce them with 1/4" dowels. Drill a hole down the middle of the joint, swab in some glue, then tap the dowel into place. The result is an easily cut, simple tenon that helps keep rails and stiles united, even if you did need to draw them together under a bit of pressure. It's an easy way to create a kind of tiny mortise-and-tenon joint.

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SHOP TIME!

Fume Extractor for Woodburning, Carving, etc.!

When we woodburn, carve, and sand, fumes and dust are created. We also may be in tight surroundings. At the Midwest Scrollsaw Trade Show, one of the demonstrators was using the unit shown right while woodburning.

What's great about it? It has a small footprint, the suction tube is bendable, it is variable speed, and the carbon and HEPA filters can be washed.

It can be purchased from Amazon for about \$80. Who makes it? Kotto and it is listed as a *fume extractor*.





First Aid Kit for Woodworkers

It can happen. You cut yourself. You get a sliver. Anything can happen in the shop. We need to make sure that the proper materials are available nearby. Why not create a shop first aid kit? What's needed?

- Various Bandages in a variety of sizes and shapes. Knuckle and finger-tip bandages are great for the shop.
- Butterfly Strips and Steri-Strips hold wounds closed.
- Gauze Pads should be included for larger wounds.
- Gauze Roll will hold pads on.
- Medical Tape will also hold the gauze pads in place.
- CA Glue can be used to "stitch a wound closed!
- Quick Clot stops bleeding fast.
- Antibiotic Ointment should be applied to wounds even after cleaning.
- Alcohol Wipes are great to clean areas when water is not available.
- Tweezers are great for digging out splinters—heavy duty and very sharp ones
- Magnifying Headset when you need to see better!
- Splinters for fingers especially although you might have wood!
- Tourniquets help to apply pressure at an amputation site (let's hope not!)
- Instant Cold Packs and a Zip-Lock Bag can be used for amputations
- An formal Eyewash Station may not be possible but add a bottle of sterile saline solution to help flush debris out of the eye.


Everything should be in a wall-mounted and labeled box. Periodically, check the contents of the box, being sure to verify that the bandages still are *sticky!*

MORE SHOP TIME!

Are you looking for a better way to store your clamps? Do you have rafters in your shop on which you could attach this type of rack and still reach the clamps when you need them? It's a good project that is pretty cheap to make. Just remember, if you have higher ceilings in your shop area, you will need to adjust the size of the end panels that attach the clamp unit to your rafter so you can reach the clamps.

Attaching Scrolling Patterns to Wood

There are several methods scrollers use to attach their patterns to wood. Some use the removable spray adhesive. Some use rubber cement. Some use glue sticks (<u>not the cheap kids version!</u>). Some use the Xyron system but the removable adhesive cartridges are not available.

Whatever the method, scrollers also use a variety of methods to <u>prepare</u> <u>their blanks</u> to add "glue" as a <u>lubricator for the blades to operate better</u>. If using the Xyron system, nothing additional is needed. Many use blue tape to cover the wood and then apply the pattern to the wood. Another option? Cover the surface with <u>clear</u>, <u>removable shelf liner</u>. The best product is Duck brand. There are 2 sizes of this product — 12 inch and 18 inch. Some stores carry it. You can purchase 6 12 inch rolls on Amazon with the name <u>EasyLiner Adhesive Shelf Liner for Cabinets & Cupboards</u> for about \$42. The 18" roll at Walmart is about \$6 if you can find it. One advantage of the clear shelf liner? You can see the grain of the wood when applying patterns.



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EDUCATIONAL SCHOLARSHIP

You may have heard mention that the Board of Directors was developing a *Train the Trainer Scholarship Program*. At their September 27th meeting, the scholarship form was finalized and we are ready to start rolling it out.

What Is It? It is a way for members in good standing to receive money to support their attendance at a training program of their choosing as long as they agree to return and provide club training. The member becomes a "subject-matter expert".

What Do I Need to Do Once I Return? In order to receive the scholarship, you must present a club demonstration and/or workshop training others on what you learned. Additionally, you must provide a summary of the training that can be used in the newsletter.

How Much Money is Available? Upon review of the application, the Board will decide how much to fund for the course.

How Do I Apply? The draft scholarship form is available on the website under "Home/About/Forms". There will be a notice on the homepage and link to the form.

Then What? The completed form MUST be submitted to the club email account — woodcny@gmail.com — at least 90 days before scheduled training. It will then be distributed to the Board of Directors for review. The Board will review at its next meeting. It is suggested that you submit well in advance of the training to ensure the review occurs.

How Do I Get Paid? You will be required to submit your payment request to the treasurer using the club's *Reimbursement Form* (also on the website).

MONTHLY CHALLENGE-TURNING SIG




The January 2024 Challenge will be a lamp based on the October demonstration by Jim Yonkers. It will be great to see what everyone creates after Jim showed us so many variations!



SHOP TIME BONUS-TIPS FOR THE TURNERS


LATHE TOOL RACK: KEEP TRACK OF TURNING TOOLS

When I'm turning a piece on the lathe, I don't want to have to hunt for the right tool. With a few pieces of scrap and a little effort, I made a simple

accessory for keeping them close to the work.

The rack starts with a base made from 1/4" plywood. I sized it for the number of tools I have while allowing it to overhang the front of the lathe stand or benchtop. I used a Forstner bit to drill the holes.

A strip of 3/4" pine fastened to the back edge of the base butts against the lathe bed, preventing the rack from falling



out when loaded with tools. The rack easily slides under the bed and out of the way when not needed. On my benchtop model, the tool rack fits nicely on top of the bench and under the lathe bed. If your lathe is freestanding, the rack can easily be modified to fit the lathe stand.

THE WEIGH-EASY WAY TO MEASURE MOISTURE CONTENT

enjoy turning bowls from green stock, but knowing when the wood has reached equilibrium moisture content (the point where it neither gains nor loses moisture dramatically) requires a pricey moisture meter. Try this instead: Weigh each bowl on a simple and affordable digital kitchen scale after rough turning, note the date and weight on a card, and toss the card into the bowl. Periodically weigh each bowl, making note of the date and weight on the card each time. When the bowl stops losing weight, it's ready for final turning and finish application.



CUT KERFS FOR EASY TOOL-REST ADJUSTMENT

When turning, almost every tool change requires resetting a lathe's tool-rest height. To make switching between common heights simpler, lock the tool rest to the desired height, and then cut a shallow kerf around the tool post, resting your hacksaw on the lathe's banjo to keep the cut straight. De-burr the kerf, mask it off with tape, and paint the kerf. Apply a different color paint or nail polish for each ring to make coordinating tools with their corresponding heights a breeze.

Access to a Resource Directory is also available only to members. Members of AAW also receive savings of up to 50% on AAW merchandise, including project books, DVDs, logo apparel, and more. Members can apply for an educational opportunity grant whereby an individual can receive compensation toward woodturning education for expenses such as tuition, registration, travel, lodging, meals, etc. They can also apply for professional outreach program fellowship grants to encourage creative growth or research, or to provide inspiration for new directions in turned wood art. The AAW Forum is also available to members as are other restricted articles and resources on the AAW website. Members receive a discount on registration for the annual Symposium which is in Louisville, Kentucky in 2023. Check out the AAW website - www.woodturner.org.



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SHOP TIME BONUS: THE ULTIMATE SANDING BLOCK

S anding blocks are ideal for smoothing out rough areas of a workpiece. However, most sanding blocks are too small and changing sandpaper can be difficult. Here is a sanding block that fits comfortably in your hand and uses a toggle clamp to sandwich the sandpaper tight in the block.

The sanding block is made from 3 layers of plywood. The base holds the sandpaper and the toggle clamp. The middle clamping block and top piece that form the hand grip are joined together with screws. They each have a cutout in the center for the toggle clamp. And, the clamping block has a shelf area for the head of the

clamp to provide adequate pressure. Shape the top as needed to fit your hand and make a comfortable grip




The **fire station** is located southeast of Baldwinsville just south of the intersection of three roads—River Road, Hicks Road, and Patchett Rd.— off River Rd.

If you take Rt 370 north from John Glenn Blvd, River Rd is the first right after going across the bridge. The firehouse is 2 miles from that turn. You can also go to the traffic light on Rt 370 which is Hicks Rd, and make a turn onto Hicks (head up the hill).

If you are coming from Rt. 31, take a left onto River Rd (on the west side of Belgium Bridge), and head south about 2 miles past the new YMCA.

Please be aware that when attending meetings or events at the firehouse, DO NOT park on the grass or in front of the firehouse bay doors, or park such that others cannot enter the parking lot. If there is an alarm, the firefighters will drive right over your vehicle if it is in the way. The septic system is in the grassy areas. There is plenty of street parking. The Community Room entrance is on the north side of the building.
