

What Can You Make for Our Sales?

Items that are regularly needed for the craft show sales are listed below.

Non-Ornament Items: Small cars/trucks, Small Puzzles, Small boxes, Small Vases/Weed Pots, Pens, Seam Rippers, Candlesticks/Tea Light Holders, Wizard Wands, Ice Cream Scoops, Yo-Yos, Magnets, Bottle Stoppers, Small Clocks, Letter Openers, Bottle Openers, Light Pulls, Keychains, Ring Holders, Small Cutting Boards, Small Bowls, & Small Dishes.

Ornaments: Most any ornaments are desired. We are out of sleds. Canal boats could sell if we had them. We are out of many of our popular flat **Scrolled** ornaments like,

- ◆ automotive centered like trains; planes, & cars;
- ◆ service groups like firemen, policemen, etc.;
- ◆ military emblems and the like;
- ◆ male/female at computer;
- ◆ male/female working a computer game console;
- ◆ birds, particularly hummingbirds, cardinals, eagles, penguins, but all are great!;
- ◆ animals are popular but we are regularly asked for dogs, cats, elephants, lions, bears, koala bears, hedgehogs, dinosaurs, etc.;
- ◆ sports in both male and female likenesses and all sports like baseball/softball, basketball, cheerleading, crew, cycling, field hockey, fishing, football, golf, gymnastics, hockey, lacrosse, running, skiing, snowboarding, soccer, tennis, volleyball, wrestling, ballet, dance, fencing, sailing.

Turned ornaments are always accepted. We always need sea urchin ornaments. We have a few ball ornaments with finials but can use more of various sizes. Bird houses are popular, especially if they have a bird. We need angels, light bulbs, small lighthouses, drums, snowmen, bells, lolly-pops, ice cream cones, acorns, and anything you can think of!!! Be creative!

Holiday-Related Items: We have no nativity scenes left. We have very few 5-6" crosses left. We have no larger crosses. We always need angels. We could use items depicting the 12 days of Christmas, esp. Partridge in a Pear Tree. We only have dreidels for the Jewish faith patrons.

WOOD EDUCATION—REDHEART

Looking for wood in the red tones? Consider *redheart*, sometimes known to the Mayans as *Chakte Kok*. Redheart is grown primarily in Mexico's Yucatan Peninsula, Belize, and Guatemala but is also found as far south as the Paraguay and southern Brazil.

The heartwood of redheart (*Sickingia salvadorensis*) is characterized by its reddish base – ranging from dull to bright pink, pinkish-red, or red. Most of the wood has diversely colored streaks and highlights in darker red tones to yellows, oranges, and even occasional purples.

If you want the red to remain, you must use a UV inhibitor in your finish or the wood will turn honey/brown when exposed to sunlight.

This hardwood can have irregular and wild grains as well as those that are pretty straight. Its texture is fine and smooth. Machining and

cutting the wood does not dull the tools like some of the exotics.

The trees grow to a maximum height of 70' with small diameters that rarely exceed 18". The bark and sap have been used commercially to create a red dye but, as with the heartwood, the color fades when exposed to the sun.

Specific Gravity: 0.65
Hardness: 1210lb Janka
Density: 31 pcf
Tangential Movement: 8%
Radial Movement: 3%
Volumetric Shrinkage: 11%
Durability: Moderate

The world of identifying wood can be confusing for even seasoned professionals. Redheart is commonly called *Chakte Kok*. This species has been previously placed in the *Sickingia* genus. Another species that's also in the *Rubiaceae* family is *Cosmocalyx spectabilis*, which is typically sold interchangeably as *Chakte Kok*. A third, botanically unrelated wood (*Erythroxylaceae* family), which bears an uncanny similarity in nearly every respect to the two other species is *Erythroxylum havanense*, which is most commonly sold as Redheart.



JANKA HARDNESS SCALE

The **Janka hardness test** (from the Austrian-born emigrant Gabriel Janka, 1864-1932) measures the resistance of a sample of wood to denting and wear. It measures the force required to embed an 11.28 millimetres (0.444 in) diameter steel ball halfway into a sample of wood. When testing wood in lumber form the Janka test is always carried out on wood from the trunk of the tree (known as the heartwood) and the standard sample (according to ASTM D143) is at 12% moisture content and clear of knots.

Depending upon where you look, the Janka rating may be different for the same species of wood.

What is the softest wood? Balsa at 22lbf. Basswood is 410lbf and both Aspen and Buckeye Burl are considered softer.

What is the hardest wood? Most say Lignum Vitae tops the scale at 4500lbf but Quebracho comes in between 4570 and 4800lbf and Australian Buloke, an ironwood tree, tips the scale at 5060lbf!




ORGANIZE YOUR CLAMPS!



It doesn't matter if we are a carver, a scroller, a turner, or a woodworker, we all have clamps that need to be organized. Here is one idea for a wall unit to hold your clamps.



Floor space in most shops is a premium but circulating air is a must. Why not look up to create a solution? Here's a great idea that can be added to your shop!

Make the plywood base long enough so you can aim the fan in different directions and locations!

To make the based, cut a groove down the center and install the T-track.



MORE SHOP TIME!

Use Brad Point Bits for Woodworking

Drilling accurate holes matters when constructing our wood-based projects. Twist bits come in three (3) different styles—multi-purpose, pilot point, and brad point.

Most of us start with **multi-purpose bits** that have a tip shaped like a V. The larger the diameter of the bit, the greater the chance of tearout. To rid yourself of tearout, use a backer board, moving your piece to new areas of the backer board each time you drill. Getting your drill bit at the exact location you need drilled can be assisted by using an awl or punch to mark the hole. This type of bit can be used to enlarge a drill hole as it centers itself.





The **pilot point bit** by Dewalt is a modification to the multi-purpose bit. It has a small extended portion that acts like it is drilling a pilot hole and should reduce skating when starting. However, it may impact



your ability to center the bit in your hole. The bit will create tearout.

Brad point bits have a long sharp point in the center that allow you to place the bit where you want to drill. The bits have spurs on the leading edges that shear the wood to create cleaner holes than any other bits. These bits are not for enlarging holes. Be aware that there are two designs of brad point bits—one that works best in hardwoods and one for softwood. Bits designed for softwood drilling produce too much heat and are hard to push into hardwoods. Those made for hardwood drilling will cut softwood but the aggressive cutting edges have a tendency to lift the weak grains of the softwood producing a ragged edge around the opening of the hole. The difference is in the design of the spurs—rounded spurs for softwood drilling and sharp point spurs for hardwood drilling.

CORPORATION BUSINESS—HARASSMENT





DIRECTIONS TO MEETINGS

WOODWORKERS, TURNERS, & SCROLLERS MEETINGS

The Turners Advisory Team listened to its members and decided to move their meetings to the **Community Room at Belgium Cold Springs Fire Department, 7920 River Road, Baldwinsville, NY** where the Woodworkers and Scroller meet. The Woodworkers of CNY was formed in September 2017, combining the woodworking groups in Central New York into one consolidated entity. Four *Committees of the Corporation* (aka Special Interest Groups) focus member's attention on three different woodworking genres—carving, scrolling, & turning—as well as the broader, all-encompassing general woodworking area. Members may attend any of the meetings at no additional charge (unless there is a project or speaker charge).

The Woodworkers of CNY was reaccepted as a chapter of the American Association of Woodturners (AAW) in May 2018. We encourage you to join AAW as it is an excellent organization with great resources as a member. Membership in AAW costs either \$50 for an online only or \$60 for a paper-based membership. Each membership includes the 6 issues of the journal, *American Woodturner*, with the online membership receiving it only online. You also have access to a large collection of online resources such as the publication *AAW Fundamentals* which is published on the off months from the journal.



AAW is an international organization of over 14,000 members of varying woodturning skills. In addition to receiving current issues of the journal, *American Woodturner*, membership also provides online access to all past issues of the Journal from 1986 forward. Access to a Resource Directory is also available only to members. Members of AAW also receive savings of up to 50% on AAW merchandise, including project books, DVDs, logo apparel, and more. Members can apply for an educational opportunity grant whereby an individual can receive compensation toward woodturning education for expenses such as tuition, registration, travel, lodging, meals, etc. They can also apply for professional outreach program fellowship grants to encourage creative growth or research, or to provide inspiration for new directions in turned wood art. The AAW Forum is also available to members as are other restricted articles and resources on the AAW website. Members receive a discount on registration for the annual Symposium which is in Louisville, Kentucky in 2020. Check out the AAW website - www.woodturner.org.

TRUING LUMBER WITHOUT A JOINTER


No jointer? No problem! You can still mill flat boards with square edges.

TO RIP A STRAIGHT EDGE ON BOARDS


Build this sled and use it as a secure platform. To make a T-slot, use a Forstner bit to drill $\frac{3}{8}$ " deep starting holes where shown; then run your router against a straightedge clamped to the sled base and plow the channel between the two holes with a $\frac{3}{8}$ " straight router bit. Without moving the straightedge, install a T-slot cutter bit and rout the channel.

To use the sled, let the rough edge of the workpiece overhang the sled and secure the workpiece with hold-down clamps. Butt the opposite edge of the sled against your fence and rip the crooked edge away.




Too Thick for the Tablesaw?

Use a router, bearing-guided flush-trim bit, and a plywood straightedge instead. As with jointing on the tablesaw, one edge of the workpiece must overhang the straightedge. A $\frac{1}{16}$ " overhang should be adequate for most boards. Set the cutting depth so that the bearing runs against the straightedge, as shown, then trip the rough edge.



For Small, Short, or Highly Figured Boards Prone to Tear-Out

Set up your router table as an edge jointer. This technique also saves time when edge jointing several pieces because you won't have to clamp a straightedge to each workpiece. To start, install a straight bit in your router table, and then use thin spacers to offset the outfeed side of the table $\frac{1}{16}$ " as shown.
